## **Online Subscriptions:**

Complete Issues – Search for a range of articles and statistics for all subjects Issues Online – Resources include articles, statistics and informative videos for a range of subjects. You can also access each book from the 'Issues' series in an e-book format

## Citing and Referencing - Help for Homework

## Why do we need to reference?

Any ideas and words you use from someone else belongs to them, not you. Therefore, you must acknowledge where you have found your information.


If you do not credit someone when you use their words, it is considered plagiarism. This can mean your work at school and university will be penalised – in some cases plagiarism can be prosecuted!

### When do we reference?

- If you are quoting directly from someone else's work in quotation marks
- If you summarise and use someone else's opinion
- If you put someone's ideas into your own words
- If you use images or data by someone else

## How do we reference?

Harvard referencing is a common way to reference. There are two elements to it:




your citation; the author, the date, and the page number (if you are not referencing the whole book)

This list should give more detail about your source of information, giving enough to allow the reader to find it

# How to create a list of references (bibliography):

This should include all material you have cited, organised alphabetically by author surname.



#### Information to include:

- Surname and initial of author
- Year published
- Title and edition no.
- Place published
- Publisher

#### Format:

Author, A. (year of publication) Book Title Nth edition. Place of publication: Publisher

#### Example:

Rowling, J.K. (1997) Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone 1<sup>st</sup> edn. United Kingdom: Bloomsbury



#### Information to include:

- Surname and initial of author, or corporate author
- Year site was published
- Title of website or online document
- Full web address
- Date you accessed website

## Format:

Author, A. (year of publication/ update) Website or resource title [online] Available from <web address> [Day Month Year ]

#### Example:

BBC (2018) Thomas Splint [online] Available from https://www.bbc.co m/bitesize/clips/zjp2 tfr [14th November 2018]

# The Virtual Library:

Offered by Bedfordshire Libraries, the Virtual Library can be accessed from a PC, or smart device. Some of the resources have apps that you can download.

Whilst the libraries are physically closed, signing up for an online membership (if you do not already have a card) will give you access to:

- RBDigital a service offering magazines, e-books and e-audio
- AncestryLibrary Trace your history and find out if you have any famous relatives from the past!
- Britannica Library With information pitched at Junior, Student and Adult levels, use Britannica for research. Great for schoolwork and any general projects
- Credo Reference Similar to Britannica, and equally useful for research on almost any topic
- PressReader An online newspaper and magazine service, with over 7,000 titles from 120 countries in 60 different languages! Whether you want to find out what's going on in the world today, catch up on the lives of your favourite celebs, or learn a new skill from the many craft magazines available, PressReader has something for everyone
- Theory Test Pro for learner drivers to test their theory knowledge
- And more!
